

**VILLAGE OF SEVILLE**  
**February 12, 2018**  
**Council Minutes**

Mayor Carter called the meeting to order at 7:00 PM.

The meeting began with the Pledge of Allegiance and a prayer.

Present: Sue Frey (President), Leslie Miller, Rick Stallard, Kathy Rhoads, Rick Vierheller

Absent: Brad Demiter

Amendments to the agenda: None

Mrs. Frey moved to approve the payment of the bills. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Miller. The motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Stallard moved to approve the minutes from 01-08-2018. The motion was seconded by Mr. Vierheller. The motion passed unanimously with the exception of Mrs. Miller who abstained.

Mrs. Rhoads moved to appoint Jan Vierheller to Public Records Commission. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Miller. The motion passed unanimously with the exception of Mr. Vierheller who abstained.

Mr. Stallard moved to appoint Kevin Nehrenz to the Zoning & Planning Commission. The motion was seconded by Mr. Vierheller. The motion passed unanimously.

Dan Risko from the Ohio Treasurer's Office updated Council on its' participation in the Ohio Checkbook program. Reports are being submitted directly to Mr. Risko on a quarterly basis as Council requested.

Judge Stephen McIlvaine from the Wadsworth Municipal Court gave his yearly review of the Courts' activities. A copy of the report is attached to these minutes.

Privilege of the floor:

Sue Frey announced that the annual Easter Egg Hunt will be held on March 24<sup>th</sup> at 1:00 PM at Cy Hewitt Park. The cleaning of the eggs will be on March 6<sup>th</sup>.

Mayor Carter gave the State of the Village address. A copy of the address is attached to these minutes.

Solicitor's Report-Ted Lesiak

There was an error in the original survey done s for the Bike Trail. All of the land required for the trail was not transferred to the Village. Because of the amount of time

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passed, resolving the issue will not be easy. The original owner has been deceased for over 10 years and tracking down the heirs and having them sign off on transferring the land to the Village and having a new survey performed could be a long, expensive, and potentially futile process if the heirs to the property do not want to transfer the land to the Village. Another resolution to the problem would be to relocate the trail to parcels already owned by the Village.

Medina County has determined that the sidewalk assessments that were assessed on the 2018 tax bills should be on the 2019 tax bills instead. The Village submitted the tax bills as required by the County. Individuals assessed on their 2018 tax bills will receive a credit and then be rebilled on their 2019 tax bills. All of the assessments will still be paid over a five-year period, it will just be pushed back one year.

Mr. Lesiak also explained some of the legal issues hampering the payment of medical bills by OPEC-HC. A hearing before a judge is scheduled for February 20<sup>th</sup> to clear up some of the issues.

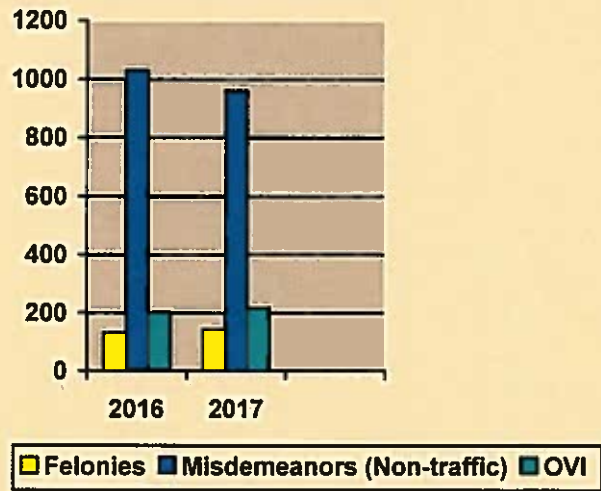

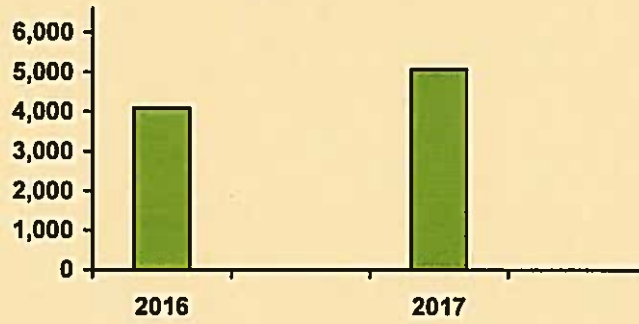

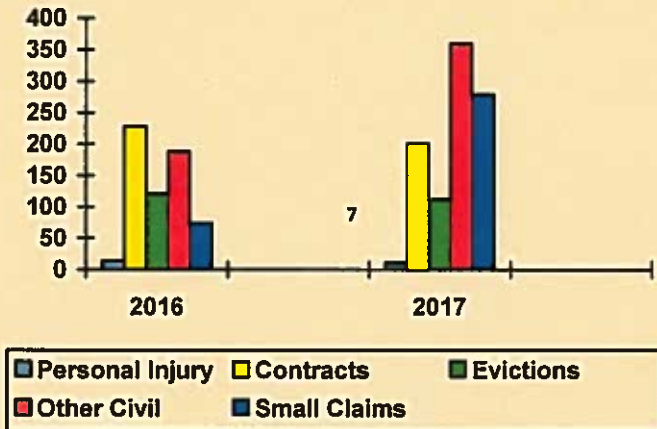
### 2017 Cases - Traffic and Criminal

### 2017 Cases - Civil



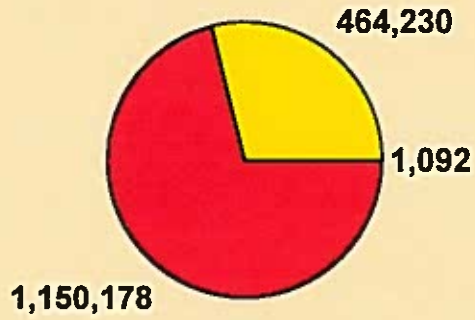

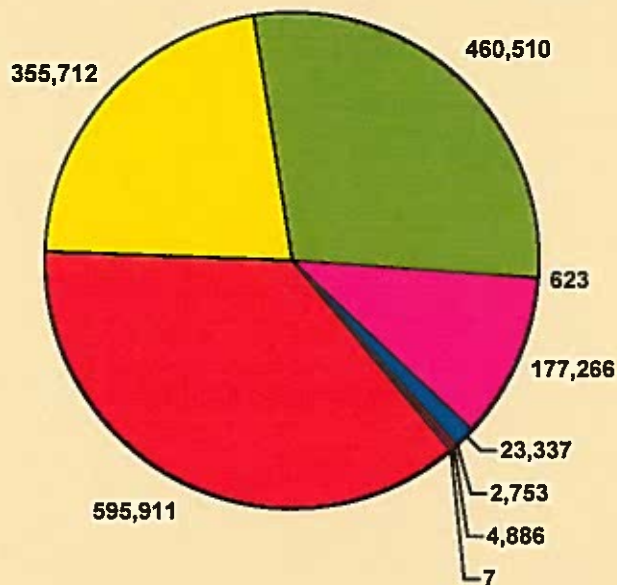
